



I decided to fly through a couple of the groups, as it was their first day of work. I stumbled upon the **Climate Change Working Group** just as Sherief Emam, a name even us owls know, started the meeting presenting some very interesting questions. Amir Abdelfattah divided the participants into two teams like two flocks of birds going their separate ways. Team 1 had to come up with arguments and policies for putting up solar panels that could power a whole forest of human nests. Team 2, on the other hand, had to defend the old ways of conventional energy sources. Their task was not just to win the argument but to learn from each other and gain understanding about climate change, super!



As the session continued, I admired the ambitious projects proposed by the sub-groups, a mix of engaging surveys, videos, and presentations about the climate change scenario. Their enthusiasm for highlighting regional diversity and individual action against climate change resonated with my owl heart. It's obviously important to me as I am a part of the wildlife these humans are taking energy from! The group seemed concerned as well, especially with the complexity of the chain of action and the future of their next generations.

Let's hear what one of the participants had to say about the Group Work:

Hello! I'm Musa from Egypt originally. I come from Turkey right now for the ISWI program. I'm participating in the group of Climate Change which is very essential and very sensitive for our future generations, therefore it's a good experience to meet each other and share experiences.





Engaged in these deep discussions I decided to fly towards the **Peacebuilding and Philosophy and Ethics Co-Joined Group Work**. The collaboration between the "Peacebuilding" and "Philosophy and Ethics" groups was an epic mash-up of knowledge and ethical dilemmas. I was surprised by their effective use of respectful dialogue to discuss local conflicts that have a global impact such as the Ukraine-Russia War, LGBTQ+ Rights issue in Guatemala, conflicts in South Sudan, etc. Given the state of my existence as an owl, I didn't know about this "Socratic Method" they were using. So, they explained to me that the Socratic method is a form of cooperative argumentative dialogue between individuals, based on asking and answering questions to stimulate critical thinking and to draw out ideas and underlying presuppositions.

And that was just the beginning! We took on the challenge of a Model United Nations simulation. Becoming diplomats, we navigated the twists and turns of the Libyan conflict. Diplomacy was in the air as we engaged in debates and negotiations. And to add even more excitement, we dove into scenario-based peacebuilding. We put our problem-solving skills to the test, brainstorming innovative ways to bring peace to the world. As true philosophers, we pondered the ethics of knowledge. How should we handle information? What impact does it have?

Minds were stretched, perspectives clashed, and critical thinking soared high!

After the Group Works ended, I flew to see the participants having the delicious **meals** at Mensa.



Afternoon to groove, no? I headed towards the **Music Group Work** which had turned into a global jam session. Imagine this: cool beautiful souls from 7 different countries all vibing on the same beat. The best part? Most of them had been strangers just a couple days ago! and now, they're practically a band!

Their fingers were dancing over guitar strings, keys, and drum pads, playing all sorts of tunes. They were even cooking up a special medley for a grand performance - I was waiting for that show! And the best part? They captured their jam session on video! The gang was so jazzed up, they decided to stick around late just to practice and get every note perfect. Talk about dedication!

This proves that knowledge and melody can build bridges, not walls. Music doesn't care where you're from or what language you speak. What a hoot to see music breaking down barriers and bringing everyone together under a common goal.

I needed to maintain all the vibes up after all the groove from the Music Group Work, so I had to fly and fly until I found the **Dance and Theatre Group Work**.

I loooved their vibrant flurry of action. Try imagining twelve artistic souls from eleven different countries gathering into a whirl of colors, sounds, and movements!

I saw them as they mirrored each other's movements in an improvisation exercise that felt like a beautifully choreographed game of follow-the-leader. This boosted their self-confidence and brought them closer, creating a silent symphony of movements and emotions.



They turned into their inner selves too, connecting with their deepest emotions through meditation and dance in nature. From body percussion to traditional dances of their home countries, every exercise added a unique note to their dance symphony.

And what's a dance without music, right? They teamed up with the Music Group Work for a day, their performance lighting up the stage with live music. Following this rhythmic rendezvous, they pondered over intriguing questions like "Where does the connection between dancing and knowledge lie?" and "Could dance exist without music?"

Following dinner, I joined the thought-provoking discussions on the **Panel "The Burden and Responsibility of Investigative Journalist**" with the investigative journalists Sylke Gruhnwald and Elena Loginova along with the researcher Prof. Dr. Jessica Kunert. It was a very interactive panel, as they used Menti.com to get answers and thoughts from the audience.

The first speaker, Sylke Gruhnwald, talked about her work as an investigative reporter based in Switzerland. She pondered around the often association of neutrality and objectivity in journalism and claimed that it was a much utopian idea to achieve in reality.

The second speaker Elena Loginova, also an investigative journalist but from Ukraine, is involved with the Organized Crime and Corruption Reporting project (OCCRP) and talked about the importance of fact checking.

The last speaker, Prof Dr. Jessica Kunert, from the University of Mainz brought her research discussion on the problems faced by especially female investigative journalists, the ways in which technology helps them.



After those remarkable discussions, in order to rest my owl brain from all those complex human concepts, right after the panel, I decided to spread my wings and dive right into the fun of the **Intercultural Game Night.**

Firstly, I was given a cultural bingo card that had me asking the participants for the most random sorts of information to be able to fill it. Trust me, it was crazy fun! I zoomed into the dexterity games area. Jungle Speed was a riot, and the fast-moving games like Ubengo had everyone on their toes (including me and my wings!)

The talking games room was next, and it was noisy! The games had everyone whispering and guessing. If laughter could be measured, this room was off the charts! In the "get to know" games room everyone was swapping stories, laughing, and playing games like Two Truths & One Lie. Next, I swooped into the video games room: everywhere I looked, folks were hunched over screens. having a blast with games like Gartic Phone and GeoGuessr.

The social deduction games room was a mystery-filled adventure, and I couldn't miss the Werewolf Mafia. Language activities had everyone chattering away in Spanish, Hindi, Bengali, Persian, and Arabic. It was like a United Nations meeting, but with way more of a vibe! Finally, I fluttered over to giant games. Imagine a bunch of humans playing Twister and Ludo, all tangled up and laughing. In a nutshell, the intercultural game night was like a giant playground for all. We had games, laughter, new friends, and tons of fun.

Next day, as the sun started to appear in the horizon of our familiar Ilmenau, I opened my eyes along with the slack app to see the programme for the day. Luckily, without a miss, the ISWI Team had uploaded Monday's plan the day before.

We also engaged in a lively debate on the issue of "Al replacement of human translators." It was a hot topic that sparked passionate arguments from both sides. Also, one of the group members also showcased his work on preserving the heritage site of Mohenjo Daro belonging to the Indus Valley Civilization through Artificial Intelligence and portraying it through Virtual Reality.

With the excitement of this media and internet related Group Work I decided to open my computer to see how the online groups were doing so dived into the digital adventure online ISWI offers. I found out the online session was making things look alive, which was very advantageous for those who couldn't join the festival in Ilmenau. My feathers were ruffled with excitement when I realized so many face-to-face group works had an online version: Gender Equality, Climate Change, Education, Media and Politics.


